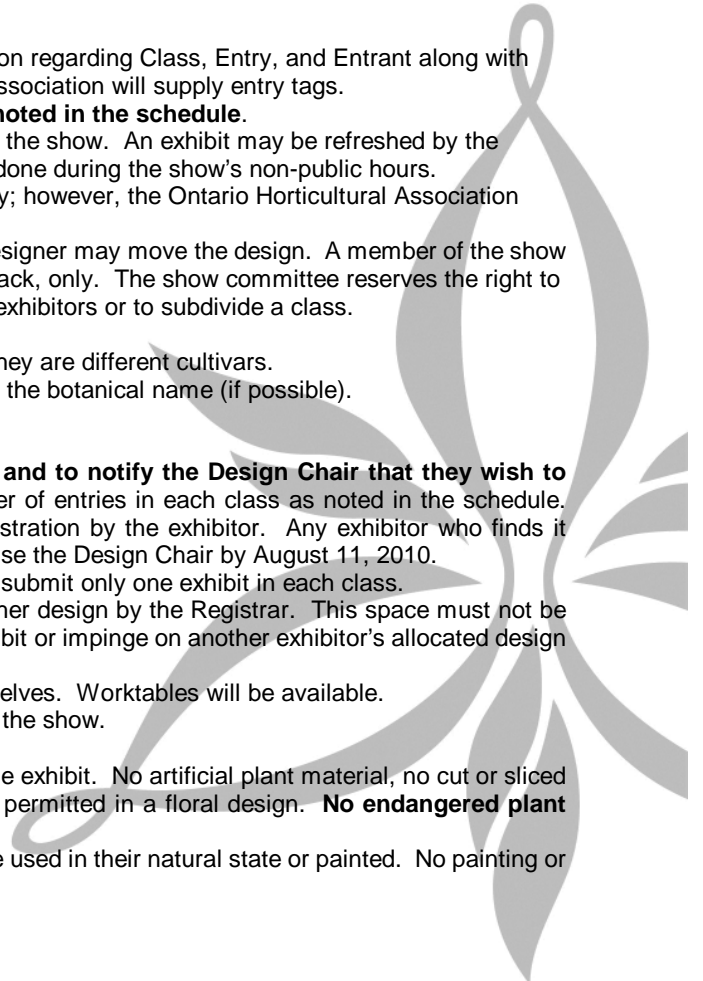

GENERAL RULES FOR HORTICULTURE AND DESIGN COMPETITION:

1. The show is open to members of the Ontario Horticultural Association and its affiliates.
2. Entry dates/times: All entries must be placed on Thursday, August 12 between 8-10:p.m. or on Friday, August 13, between 7-9:00 a.m. **No late entries will be accepted without exception.**
3. **Judging:**
 - a. Judging takes place on Friday, August 13 from 9:30 a.m. to noon, after which the show will be open to the public at 1:00 p.m.
 - b. The decision of the judges shall be final. Judges may withhold an award if, in their opinion, the exhibit is not worthy. Judging will be in accordance with the *Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards for Horticulture and Design, 2003 edition (O.J.E.S.)*. Please refer to it for definitions and information.
4. **Removal** All entries must be removed on Saturday, August 14th between 5-6:30 p.m. or Sunday, August 15th between 7:30-9:00 a.m.
5. **Entries – General**
 - a. All entries must have an entry tag, giving necessary information regarding Class, Entry, and Entrant along with entrant's home society and home mailing information. The Association will supply entry tags.
 - b. Exhibitors must provide their own containers, **except where noted in the schedule**.
 - c. All exhibits **must** be kept in show condition for the duration of the show. An exhibit may be refreshed by the exhibitor and must retain its original form. This may only be done during the show's non-public hours.
 - d. **Reasonable security will be supplied** for exhibitors' property; however, the Ontario Horticultural Association assumes no responsibility for loss or damage.
 - e. Moving entries other than your own is **not permitted**. The designer may move the design. A member of the show committee may move a design from side to side, or front to back, only. The show committee reserves the right to move horticultural entries where necessary to accommodate exhibitors or to subdivide a class.
6. **Entries – Horticultural**
 - a. Exhibitors may have multiple entries per class provided that they are different cultivars.
 - b. All entries should be named with both the common name and the botanical name (if possible).
 - c. All plant material must have been grown by the exhibitor.
7. **Entries – Design**
 - a. **Exhibitors are required to pre-register by June 30, 2010 and to notify the Design Chair that they wish to enter, as soon as possible.** There will be a limited number of entries in each class as noted in the schedule. Space will be reserved in each exhibit for design, upon registration by the exhibitor. Any exhibitor who finds it necessary to withdraw must find their own substitute and advise the Design Chair by August 11, 2010.
 - b. Exhibitors may enter any number of Design classes, but may submit only one exhibit in each class.
 - c. A specific space will be assigned to each exhibitor for his or her design by the Registrar. This space must not be changed by any entrant. No exhibitor may move another exhibit or impinge on another exhibitor's allocated design space.
 - d. All designs must be made and stages by the exhibitors themselves. Worktables will be available.
 - e. All designs must be kept in show condition for the duration of the show.
 - f. Accessories are permitted.
 - g. Plant material must predominate over other components of the exhibit. No artificial plant material, no cut or sliced fruit, dairy products or perishable food is allowed. No soil is permitted in a floral design. **No endangered plant species or coral are permitted to be used.**
 - h. Dried or preserved plant material and decorative wood may be used in their natural state or painted. No painting or dying of fresh plant material is allowed.

7. Entries – Design, continued

- i. For the Design Section, plant material may be from any source.

8. Definitions:

- a. Visible Use of Water: this would include a water-viewing design or an underwater design. See O.J.E.S.

9. Novice – an exhibitor who has not won a first prize in a standard show.

10. Prizes and Awards

- a. **OHA Design:** ribbons and prize money will be awarded.
 - i. 1st place - \$10.00; 2nd place - \$8.00; 3rd place - \$6.00; Best in Show – ribbon only, Judge's Choice – ribbon only.
- b. **O.H.A. Horticulture:** ribbons and prize money will be awarded.
 - i. 1st place - \$3.00; 2nd place - \$2.00; 3rd place - \$1.00; Best in Show –ribbon only, Judge's Choice – ribbon only.

O.H.A. Design: Ribbons and prize money will be awarded as follows:
1st place - \$10.00; 2nd Place - \$8.00; 3rd Place - \$6.00

All design classes will be staged on a 76 cm (30") high table, with a white tablecloth and in a white niche. All spaces, unless otherwise specified in the schedule, will be 61 cm (24") wide by 76.20 (30") deep by 73.66 cm (29") high.

Class 1. Everything Old is New Again A design, Limit 7 entries.

Class 2. Barrie's Bounty A mass design. Limit 7 entries.

Class 3. Gateway to the North A design. Limit 7 entries.

Class 4. The Sky's the Limit A design. Limit 7 entries.

Class 5. Farmer's Market A design. Limit 7 entries.

Class 6. Down by the Bay...A design with the visible use of water (see Underwater Design, O.J.E.S. 2003, page 107; water viewing design, page 108). Limit 7 entries.

Class 7. Less is More A small design, to be displayed in a white niche, max. size 25.4 cm (10") in any direction. Limited 8 entries.

Class 8. Pixie Pollinators A miniature design, to be displayed in a white niche, max. size 12.7 cm (5") in any direction.
a) Fresh materials only. Limit 8 entries.
b) Dry materials only. Limit 8 entries.

SECTION A - ANNUALS

- Class 9 Aster, 1 cultivar - 3 sprays
- Class 10 Cosmos, 1 cultivar - 3 sprays
- Class 11 Geranium, 1 cultivar – 1 stem with foliage
- Class 12 Marigold, over 7.5cm (3"), 1 cultivar – 3 blooms with foliage
- Class 13 Marigold, 2.5 – 7.5cm (1-3"), 1 cultivar –3 blooms with foliage
- Class 14 Petunia, single, 1 cultivar - 3 sprays
- Class 15 Petunia, semi-double or double, 1 cultivar, 3 sprays
- Class 16 Salvia, 1 cultivar - 5 stems
- Class 17 Snapdragon, 1 cultivar - 1 stem
- Class 18 Sunflower - 1 stem
- Class 19 Zinnia, any type, 1 cultivar - 3 stems
- Class 20 Any other annual not listed above, growth habit under 33 cm. (15"), 1 cultivar - 3 blooms, stems, spikes, or sprays
- Class 21 Any other annual not listed above, growth habit 33 cm. (15") and over, 1 cultivar -3 blooms, stems, spikes, or sprays

SECTION B – HARDY PERENNIALS

- Class 22 Coreopsis, 1 cultivar - 3 stems
- Class 23 Echinacea (Coneflower), 1 cultivar – 3 stems
- Class 24 Hosta - green, 1 cultivar, 3 leaves
- Class 25 Hosta – gold, 1 cultivar, 3 leaves
- Class 26 Hosta – blue, 1 cultivar, 3 leaves
- Class 27 Heuchera, (Coral Bells) 1 cultivar, 3 leaves
- Class 28 Phlox, 1 cultivar - 1 stem
- Class 29 Rudbeckia, 1 cultivar - 3 stems
- Class 30 Ornamental grass, sedge, or rush, 1 cultivar, 3 stems
- Class 31 Any other perennial, growth habit under 33 cm. (15"), 1 cultivar - 3 stems, spikes, or sprays
- Class 32 Any other perennial, growth habit 33 cm. (15") and over, 1 cultivar - 3 stems, spikes, or sprays

SECTION C – FLOWERING BULBS, CORMS, RHIZOMES AND TUBERS

- Class 33 Begonia, tuberous, 1 stem, no side buds, shown with foliage
- Class 34 Dahlia, large flowered, over 15cm. (6"), 1 stem
- Class 35 Dahlia, small flowered, under 15cm. (6"), 3 stems
- Class 36 Gladiolus, solid coloured - 1 spike
- Class 37 Gladiolus, bi-coloured - 1 spike
- Class 38 Liliium- 1 stem
- Class 39 Any other flowering bulb, corm, rhizome, or tuber not listed above - 1 stem

SECTION D - ROSES

- Class 40 Hybrid Tea - 1 specimen bloom
- Class 41 Floribunda - 1 spray
- Class 42 Grandiflora - 1 specimen bloom
- Class 43 Hardy Canadian Rose (Explorer, Morden/Parkland) - 1 spray
- Class 44 Any other Modern Shrub Rose other than Canadian (Rugosa, Austin, etc) 1 spray
- Class 45 Miniature - 1 bloom
- Class 46 Full blown rose, shown floating in a bowl or snifter

SECTION E – FLOWERING OR FRUITING BRANCHES AND VINES

- Class 47 Clematis, 1 stem, not to exceed 40.5cm (16") in length
- Class 48 Hydrangea, 1 stem
- Class 49 Buddleia, 1 stem, not to exceed 1 metre (39") in length
- Class 50 Any other flowering branch, not to exceed 1 metre (39") in length
- Class 51 Fruiting branch, not to exceed 1 metre (39") in length

SECTION F – SPECIAL COLLECTIONS

- Class 52 Collection of mixed cut garden flowers, minimum 5 types in 1 container
- Class 53 Collection of cut garden foliage, can include evergreen and broadleaf evergreen, minimum 7 types in 1 container
- Class 54 Collection of Roses, minimum 5 stems in 1 container
- Class 55 Collection of Dahlias, minimum of 5 stems in 1 container
- Class 56 Collection of cut herbs, in 1 container, minimum 5 types – named on separate card
