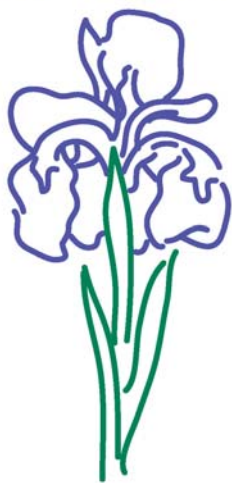

Chair's report

Bolton & District Horticultural Society (BDHS) is completing its 18th year of operation.

A highlight of the year was the announcement that BDHS was awarded the Town of Caledon Environmentalist of the Year award, presented by the Caledon Environmental Advisory Committee (CEAC). BDHS was presented with its award at the Town's Volunteer and Citizen Achievement Awards ceremony on April 22, 2013 and was inducted into the CEAC Stewardship Grove on the Trans-Canada Trail in Caledon East on June 26, 2013.

Additionally, the Bolton & District Horticultural Society was given the honour of directing a \$500 Annual Environmentalism Recognition Award to their favourite Caledon-based environmental stewardship project. The project selected was the Children's Learning Garden at the Albion Hills Community Farm (AHCf). The CEAC grant will be used to purchase crab apple trees to add to the pollinator garden planted by BDHS and AHCf volunteers in the Children's Learning Garden.

The proposed 2nd site for AHCf garden plots in Bolton did not get started in 2013 because the Highway 50 site was chosen as the preferred location for the new Bolton fire hall. It has been suggested that the 2 uses are compatible, so while this means the community garden may eventually be located at the site, for the time being, the project is on hold. Because the Bolton AHCf project did not proceed as planned, BDHS will refund the \$5000 TD FEF grant we received in 2012 to support the project.



Tree planting projects remained the focus of our civic improvements in 2013. Details are in the Environmental Report on page 4.

A celebration recognizing Donors & Volunteers was held in Bolton Mill Park in October where a plaque was unveiled. Certificates of Appreciation were awarded to organizations and individuals in recognition of their valuable contributions towards the completion of very significant Environmental, Safety and Historical projects in this Park over a 15 year period.

BDHS maintained its membership in the Ontario Horticultural Association (OHA). OHA membership provided the society with low cost General Liability Insurance and Directors and Officers Liability coverage along with other benefits such as free hosting for our website www.boltonhort.info. OHA membership dues are based on the number of members in a society from the previous year—for BDHS, this worked out to be approximately \$7.49 per member based on a membership of 51 in 2012.

The BDHS website www.boltonhort.info continued to be the main communication tool for the society in 2013. In addition to website updates, emailed notices were sent regularly to members to let them know about upcoming meetings, reminders and opportunities.

The website was awarded 1st prize in the annual OHA convention Website competition. This is the 4th year in which the website has been recognized in the OHA's top two – 3 times awarded 1st prize.

The BDHS Board held 4 Board meetings in 2012/2013 and organized 8 general meetings including the AGM. Directors took care of business by phone & email between meetings. Society board business

involved fulfilling the duties and responsibilities for Directors of corporations and charities. These duties included making required reports to Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food & Rural Affairs (OMAFRA), the Charity Directorate and the OHA.

Funds were raised through various means. Nincompoop Mulch was sold to members and delivered to Glen Echo Nurseries in Caledon East to be picked up from that location. The OHA conducted a summer bulb sale and a portion of the receipts was refunded to the society.

BDHS was the recipient of several grants. BDHS Past President (1999) Mary Sasiela applied for the CIBC Employee as Ambassador Grant and was awarded \$500. BDHS was awarded \$5000 from the Town of Caledon Green Fund - \$3750 of this grant was used during the fiscal year and the balance of \$1250 will be used next year. In addition, several organizations and individuals supported projects with generous donations.

On behalf of the Board members, thank you all for your support during the past year. It has been my pleasure and a great privilege to be Chair of the BDHS Board in 2012/2013.

2013 Environmental Projects Report

2013 Environmentalist of the Year Award

BDHS was honoured to receive the 2013 Caledon Environmentalist of the Year Award by the Caledon Environmental Advisory Committee (CEAC) during a presentation at Stewardship Grove on August 28th 2013.

This prestigious award was to acknowledge 18 years of Environmental initiative & stewardship that BDHS has performed in Caledon in partnership with like-minded local volunteer groups, governments, businesses, Service Clubs, Authorities and Funding Agencies.

The major Humber River Watershed Environmental Projects initiated by BDHS were Bolton Mill Park, Bolton Dick's Dam Park, Sunkist Woods, Taylorwood Valley & Columbia Creek, during which they raised funds and recruited community volunteers to plant approximately 2,500 native trees & shrubs.

Albion Hills Community Farm Children's Learning Garden (AHCFLG)

BDHS donated the \$2500 grant we received from TD Friends of the Environment Foundation to AHCFLG towards purchasing equipment, tools and learning materials. Volunteers started a pollinator garden plot in late summer 2013.

Albion Hills Community Farm Pollinator Garden (AHCFFG)

November 2013 - BDHS donated the \$500 grant it received from CEAC to AHCFFG to fund four large calliper crab apple trees for their Pollinator Garden. BDHS was awarded this grant as a result of being selected as Caledon's 2013 Environmentalist of the Year.

Bolton Mill Park Project

October 2013 - BDHS funded \$10,000 towards the planting of 25 large calliper trees in this Park. Donors were Town of Caledon Green Fund, Rotary & Kinsmen Clubs of Bolton, Mary Sasiela on behalf of CIBC, TRCA and the Foley & Hunt families.

Bolton Mill Park Donor & Volunteer Appreciation Celebration Event

October 2013 - BDHS hosted a Celebration Event during which a plaque was unveiled and "Certificates of Appreciation" were awarded to the following organizations and individuals in recognition of their valuable contributions towards the completion of very significant Environmental, Safety and Historical projects in this Park over a 15 year period.

The Town of Caledon and Allan Gaines donated \$4,400 towards the plaque.





Donor award recipients were Town of Caledon Community Green Fund, Toronto & Region Conservation, Bolton & District Horticultural Society, Bolton Community Action Site Committee, Rotary Club of Bolton, Kinsmen Club of Bolton, Mary Sasiela on behalf of CIBC, Green T Environmental Awareness, Allan Gane, Patti & Len Foley and Ruth & Richard Hunt.

Volunteer award recipients were Humber Valley Heritage Trail Association, Albion Bolton Historical Society, Bill Wilson, Jerry Gorman, Heather Broadbent, Brian Baird, Gary Wilkins, Brenda Heenan and Richard Hunt

The Environmental & Safety improvements and Historical projects in this Park were the Queen St (Hwy 50) Pedestrian Underpass to the east entrance of Bolton Mill Park, Wetlands that is fed from a spring on top of the hill, 300 mixed variety of both large & small calliper native coniferous & deciduous trees & shrubs, 3,000 wildflowers, Fishway and the notched dam that now allow salmon to swim upstream into the headwaters of the Humber River to spawn, McFall Lookout on the south side of the Humber which contains plaques of historical photos and details of this section of the Humber River.

Columbia Creek Watershed Project

May 2013 - BDHS funded \$7,500 towards the planting of 30 large calliper trees in the valley which extends from Columbia Way, behind Taylorwood & Longwood, through Bolton Camp into Cold Creek then into the Humber River. TRCA donated the funds to BDHS.

Peace Park Project

September 2013 - BDHS funded \$7,000 towards the planting 16 large calliper trees (8 as a back drop & 8 spaced among the park benches for shade). Donors were BDHS & James Dick Construction. BDHS is not included on the large plaque currently in place but we will be recognized on a plaque that will be installed in a spring 2014 at an event during which BDHS will be recognized for its major contributions.

September 2013 - BDHS funded \$2,450 towards the planting of 9 large calliper trees. Donors were Humber Valley Heritage Trail Association (HVHTA) via a grant from the Town of Caledon's Annual Golf Tournament and Region of Peel Chairman Emil Kolb's staff to commemorate Emil & Beryl Kolb's 55th Wedding Anniversary.

Sunkist Woods Spring and Fall 2013 Projects

May & October 2013 - BDHS & TRCA funded \$4,500 towards the planting of 250 trees and shrubs hand planted by 100 community volunteers (age range 80 days to 80 years) mainly Girl Guides & their families (best turn-out we have ever had). A great time was had by one and all, especially the children.

There was extensive pre & post event publicity including great photos. I advised TRCA that this will be our last planting in Sunkist Woods (8 in total over 8 years). TRCA, Girl Guides, MARS Canada & BDHS contributed a very generous supply of refreshments and treats which were enjoyed by all.

Educational Programs & Speakers 2013



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


